Like most Veterans he didnt talk about it too much. I had pried for a few stories since I was working with VVMF on a project for "The Wall That Heals". There were some stories that will stick with me for life and talking with him made me even more appreciate the freedoms we all have because of people like him. He was tough as nails but at the same time kind and understanding. He loved his family and people in general. I played Inline hockey with him and he was often on the other team or around the rink. In between periods when I was dying from heat he would sneak up on me and douse me with an icy wet cloth on my neck and it would bring me back to life. There was one time where another younger immature player had been giving him cheap shots and rather than strike back Phil had the guy on the ground in a matter of seconds with a half nelson arm lock behind the guys back. He then wispered in the guy ear "son you dont want to do that" referring to the cheap shots. He was cool under control. He was the kind of person that you wanted to talk with and have around for advice and good conversation and was well respected by all. I know that he is probably looking down at us and giving us his million dollar smile from Heaven.

Becky and I enjoyed many years bowling with Phil and Jean. Our team of four was named “Rolling Thunder.” Phil was known for throwing a fast ball ten pin. He was elected Master of Arms taking control of tense (but fun) moments at the bowling alley always being the mediator. We bowled in the same league for many years as we also have fond memories of bowling with his loving sister Carla and her husband Mike. We spent many evenings playing softball with made up friendly leagues populating the neighborhood park. We spent most holidays together watching fireworks on the 4th and spending all day together on Thanksgiving and Christmas. Phil would always excite the boys by playing “the claw” and “pull my finger.” We spent many all-nighters playing laser tag. Phil was the best uncle that my two sons AJ and Chris could ever wish for. He was loved very much and will always be remembered by ALL, nothing but the good times.

Occasionally I had the honor of viewing his Vietnam picture book filled with pictures of him and his buddies of the 196th Light Infantry Brigade’s Provisional Long Range Reconnaissance Patrol (LRRP). Phil described his LRRP team members and survival experiences such as being pushed out of a “whirly whirly bird,” the helicopter pilot not wanting to land due to taking on heavy fire. Phil clung to the good memories of the young men which whom he served and saved each other’s life during jungle combat. Even though Phil suffered lifelong issues attributed to Agent Orange from Vietnam, Phil never lost faith of God, family, and Country. Phil was a brother to me whom I will never forget. He will be sorely missed by friends and family and only the good times remembered. For the trumpet shall sound and we will meet again.
