“ Jesse Earl Davis was known in my family as Earl or to me and my sister as uncle Earl.

He, as the youngest of his siblings was about ten years older than me. So he and I related to each other very well. The first time I remember meeting my uncle was when my family drove from Oregon to my Grandad's farm near Readstown, Wisconsin. Uncle Earl was just at the end of his high school and was about to enter the Air Force. And most of you know he retired from the Air Force. The second time I remember him was when my family visited him in Spokane a few years later when he was stationed there. Over the next many years he flew in and out of our lives and visited us often.

I remember him as a soft spoken and generous guy. When I was stationed in New Jersey in 1960, I hitch hiked many times down to the Washington DC area, where they lived at that time. I remember he loaned me his car one very cold night to go the Club Adjacent for a few drinks. On the way back I, of course, was going too fast for the conditions and entered a round-about too fast and skidded on the ice into the center barrier. The car was somewhat damaged and he took it in stride and said “No Problem”. I particularly remember him taking me on a tour through the Pentagon, where he was working at the time. We also walked the entire distance up in the Washington Monument while I was carrying one of his kids on my shoulders. I remember numerous times he drove me to the north of DC to avoid the traffic where I could hitch back to New Jersey. A very thoughtful fellow, I declare.

On one of his trips to California, I took my mother, (his sister), and he and my family to the ocean near Big Sur and we had a wonderful time and had lunch and dinner in Carmel. My Mom and him had a great time and my wife and kids did, as well.

In the later years on a few occasions we visited him in Alexandria and would stay for the week and visited with him. We toured DC and surrounding areas, like Mount Vernon and many of the

memorials, monuments, museums other tourist attractions. He was a good tour guide, though we got lost a couple times. We had dinner one night at the Watergate and then went to a symphony. Two or three times we went with him on Nina's Dandy dinner cruises, one time was for his 75th birthday party.

I was so saddened to hear of his passing. I still mourn his departure, and will always remember our good times together. My condolences go to his Sons, stepdaughter, and their families. May he ever rest in peace.
