“ When I heard of Ray's unexpected passing I turned and looked on a shelf behind me; there was his master's thesis titled "Simulation of Photon Counting Distributions" signed by R.E. Swartwout, Don Gochenour and me on May 27, 1970. This was the extension of work I began at NASA. When I arrived back at WVU in 1968 I found students only a few years younger than me. Ray Cole was one, a fellow "ham" and a serious student. My strongest memory of Ray was his informing me about cavers. After the 1968 Farmington mine disaster I began looking for ways to communicate through the earth. It was Ray who informed me about the technology cavers were using.
